On August 23^{rd,} 2014, Black Child Development Institute of Greensboro, Inc. (BCDI-G) will mark our 35th year as a non-profit organization serving families in the Guilford County community. In-house, we started the discussion as to what we would do to celebrate this significant anniversary. We went from discussions around getting the media involved in celebrating our accomplishments, to tracking down the families involved in our programs across the years, and even pulling together the famous 130 member Black Child Development choir. But somewhere between last year and this year --in between maneuvering through the various seasons that come with leading an organization through a leadership change, riding the storms of running viable programs on a tight budget, and always looking for that tulip in a tunnel-- I ran across our original Articles of Incorporation. Signed by Sarah Herbin and William Martin, it clearly defined our organizations' original mission - "to improve the quality of life for children in general, and Black Children in particular, by fostering productive relationships between individuals, families and communities such as will create and effectuate standards, values and behavior that will enhance the development of Black Children."






ABOUT US
